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Vision Statement

The Hon'ble Supreme Court of India has in the recent past been reminding institutions, including the judiciary, of the concept of "constitutional morality." Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, speaking in the Constituent Assembly had felt that the Constitution can "live and grow on the bedrock of constitutional morality." Dr. Ambedkar had opined the constitutional morality has to be "cultivated" – it is not natural. The Hon'ble Supreme Court of India in *Manoj Narula v. Union of India* ruled that constitutional morality guides in institution building. In *Government of NCT of Delhi v. Union of India*, constitutional morality was held to be founded on "constitutional culture" which requires "existence of sentiments and dedication for realizing a social transformation which the Indian Constitution seeks to attain." In *Navtej Singh Johar v. Union of India*, the Hon'ble Supreme Court ruled that all branches of the Government, including the judiciary have to "stay alive to the concept of constitutional morality." It also noted that "strengthening of constitutional morality in contemporary India remains a duty of the organs of the State, including the judiciary." It ruled that "[t]he concept of constitutional morality would serve as an aid for the Court to arrive at a just decision which would be in consonance with the constitutional rights of the citizens."

Judicial education, hence, has to be focused on ensuring that "constitutional morality" remains the focus of adjudication, and in norm-setting by the judiciary. Judicial education has to ensure that judges are effectively educated to ensure that judicial interpretation and decision-making are based on principles of "constitutional morality." Only then will Dr. Ambedkar's vision of the Constitution "living and growing" on the bedrock of constitutional morality be attained. The Delhi Judicial Academy, hence, aims to build on its past programmes in previous years, and use judicial education as a tool to ensure attainment of the goals of the Constitution makers and the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India.

The Delhi Judicial Academy has been guided in the past by the National Judicial Education Strategy (NJES) developed by

the National Judicial Academy, which views judicial education as "creating solutions for strengthening the administration of justice." Judicial education is viewed as a process of "knowledge-sharing for problem solving." Andragogy for inservice education has been, and will hence, continue to be guided by this approach. "Perspective building," in consonance with the vision of "constitutional morality" will be one of the major goals of these programmes.

With induction programmes for newly-appointed judges being a major part of the Delhi Judicial Academy's calendar in 2019-20, equipping newly appointed judges with the skills required for "justicing" will be the primary focus. Making the judges aware of social realities, discussing the role of courts and judges, social-context adjudication, upholding and cultivating constitutional morality, judicial ethics and judicial administration, as well as personality development will be the guiding principles of the induction programme. Court attachments, village-immersion programmes, and attachments with various institutions will help achieve these goals.

The Delhi Judicial Academy has also taken up the exercise of educating other stakeholders working within the judicial system. This includes prosecutors, Special Executive Magistrates, and functionaries within the Juvenile Justice system. The objective has been, and will continue to be, experience sharing, and problem-solving through collaborative efforts. The effort is to ensure that quality of adjudication improves through strengthening the intellectual resources of other stakeholders within the system. The Academy will also continue to work with Judicial Academies within India, and outside, to strengthen judicial education. This will include conducting programmes for judges from other jurisdictions. Special programmes, in collaboration with specialized organisations, on specific areas of law will also be the focus, where appropriate.

Judicial Academies are also uniquely placed to engage in data-driven research on issues of law and adjudication. Research plays an important role in identifying issues of concern within the law, and testing approaches that the law has evolved to deal with challenges. Being institutions working within the judiciary, Judicial Academies can play a very important role in being centres of research excellence. Research that Judicial Academies undertake can be used not only to inform judicial education programmes, but also in deciding legal policy, and enacting of laws. Courts may also use such research in their adjudication. Research forms the base of any academic enterprise and of an academic institution. The Delhi Judicial Academy's vision for the upcoming year and in future years is to become a centre for excellence in research, especially data-driven research, on various issues relating to law and adjudication.

A Brief Note about Delhi Judicial Academy

A strong and independent judiciary as a guardian of the basic and fundamental rights of its citizens and having power of judicial review over administrative and legislative actions, is the very backbone of progressive nation. The exercise of such powers, judiciously, reinforces the confidence of public in its integrity. This can be achieved only by having a sensitive and proficient judiciary capable of administering fair, speedy and quality justice. It is in this backdrop that the quality education and training of judicial officers assumes importance.

The objectives of Judicial Education are explained by the Acronym ICEE by Commonwealth Judicial Education Institute, Canada. This Acronym is explained as under:

- a) Impartiality Implying an independent judiciary respected for its integrity, guided by publicized code of judicial ethics. The impartiality can only be reflected in judicial work by recognition of judicial bias and addressing it; by social context justicing and developing gender sensitivity.
- b) Competency relates to knowledge of substantive and procedural laws. This includes judicial skills such as communication skills, developing techniques of application of international conventions to domestic laws, interpretation of Constitution and Statutes, exercise of judicial discretion in delivery of judgments.
- c) Efficiency Use of technology by way of computers and computer applications, following technique of court and case management, and use of Alternate Dispute Redressal Mechanism are some of the ways of infusing efficiency in dispensation of judicial work.
- d) Effectiveness To be effective it is important for the judges to be aware of advancement in Science and Technology; social realities and vulnerabilities, our environmental issues and other related areas to be able to have a holistic view when deciding the matters.

The Delhi Judicial Academy which started functioning formally since 2002, (though it started imparting judicial education way back from 1992) has been designing and developing its programs around these principles in its endeavour to impart

judicial education and judicial training. The curriculum development is done on the basis of need assessment which is based on interactions with the judicial officers and taking their inputs in consultative programmes, through questionnaires and feedback after every programme. It is a continuous process and it is after great deliberations and discussions that the programs are chalked out.

The Delhi Judicial Academy is headed by the Hon'ble Chief Justice of Delhi High Court and is guided by Judicial Education and Training Programme Committee (JETPC) which comprises of Chairperson and four members who are all senior judges of Delhi High Court. The faculty of Delhi Judicial Academy comprises of a Chairperson who is a person of eminence from the field of education, two Directors who are senior officers of Delhi Higher Judicial Service and two Additional Directors who are also the officers of Delhi Higher Judicial Service.

OVERVIEW OF THE INFRASTRUCTURE AND FACILITIES AVAILABLE AT ACADEMY

1. ACADEMIC BUILDING

The Academic building is the most important building of the Academy where administrative offices and facilities for training are located. The Academic Building has following facilities-



Library cum Computer Lab-

The importance of a library for any training or education, including judicial education cannot be undermined. Library has subscription to a large number of journals, newspapers, latest magazines and legal software and various multi-disciplinary books. It also has a small Computer lab.





Seminar Hall-

The Academic Block has 5 seminar halls for organizing various training programmes. The seminar halls are fully-equipped with various e-facilities for effective organization of programmes.



Cafeteria-

A cafeteria having capacity of around 150 is situated at the second floor of the building.





2. HOSTEL

The Academy has air-conditioned hostel facility for Judicial Officers. The hostel has 80 rooms and one dining hall with fully functional kitchen and two common rooms on each floor. Out of the 80 rooms, 42 rooms are fully-furnished with 24x7 Wi-Fi facilities. In addition, 18 twin-sharing semi-furnished rooms are available. The well-equipped mess and hostel facility ensures a comfortable stay for the officers.



3. GUEST HOUSE

The Academy has a well-maintained Guest House with 12 air-conditioned rooms which are available for resource persons, delegates visiting the Academy for training programmes.



4. CLUB HOUSE

For recreational purposes, the Academy has a Club House. The club house has a gymnasium, a utility hall and various facilities for indoor games-table tennis, carom, snooker etc.

OVERVIEW - 2018

1. Core Competence Conferences on Strengthening of Justice Delivery System through Integration of Knowledge, Skill and Attitude in Adjudication

Core Competence Conferences aim at imparting Jurisdiction-Specific training to DHJS and DJS officers. The aim of the core competence programme is to provide a platform for exchange of ideas and sharing of best practices for day to day running of court and to implement substantive law in the most efficacious manner. In total, sixteen such conferences were organized in the year 2018 on various issues including Family Laws, Land Acquisition Laws, Sentencing Policy, Anti-Terror Laws, SC & ST (POA) Act, Electricity Laws, Reproductive Rights of Women, Forensic Evidence and Rent Control Laws.

DHJS Officers Holding CBI Courts-

A two-day conference was conducted for Special Judges (CBI) with the objective to enhance their capacity of the participants, on recent amendments in the anti-corruption laws. First day the participants were provided a platform to discuss and deliberate the issues and challenges faced while adjudicating and to share the best practices. Second day of the Conference was organized in collaboration with Directorate of Enforcement on money-laundering laws.





DHJS Officers Holding POCSO/Fast Track Court-

A Two-day training conference was organized for DJHS Officers holding Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, 2012 Fast Track Courts. The objective of the programme was to discuss both substantive and procedural challenges in a trial related to sexual offences.

DHJS Officers Holding Motor Accident Claims Tribunal-

A one-day conference was organized for Presiding Officers of Motor Accident Claims Tribunal on various jurisdictional and other challenges faced by Presiding Officers of MACT.

DHJS Officers Holding Labour Courts and Industrial Tribunal

A one-day conference was organized for Presiding Officers of Labour Courts and Industrial Tribunals on practical challenges in working of legal courts. One session was also organized on New Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code and its impact on industrial disputes.

DJS Officers/Metropolitan Magistrates Holding Mahila Courts-

A Two-day training conference was organized for Metropolitan Magistrates exercising jurisdiction over Mahila courts. In this programme, the Academy took an inter-disciplinary approach and invited experts from field of Psychology and Sociology to discuss social context of related laws.

DJS Officers/Metropolitan Magistrates Holding N.I. Courts-

A Two-day training conference was organized for Metropolitan Magistrates exercising jurisdiction over cases under Negotiable Instruments Act, 1881. The conference covered challenges concerning e-cheques, NEFT transfers, issues of sentencing and compensation etc.

2. Sensitization Programmes on Areas of Contemporary importance for the Officers of DHJS & DJS-

Justicing: Balancing Rules, Principles & Social Context and Sensitization Programme on Vulnerabilities & Disabilities-

Law and society go hand in hand which makes it imperative to have responsive judiciary, sensitive to the everchanging nature of the society and can effectively respond to the challenges by reflecting the community's values without compromising on its independence. Thus the Academy organizes Sensitization programme on vulnerabilities and disabilities. The programme aimed at addressing the concerns of marginalized sections of the society who are discriminated on the basis of their sex, age and, physical and mental disability etc.





Orientation Programme on Intellectual property Rights and Enforcement-

With the advent of technological development, intellectual property litigation has seen diverse range of challenges. Thus Orientation programme on IPR laws was organized by the Academy to acquaint the participants with the emerging issues in the field of intellectual property law and technology.

3. Orientation Programme on Law, Technology & Development (for the Officers of DHJS & DJS)-

There has been rapid rise in technological development as internet as reached virtually every hook and corner of world. This advancement on the one hand has made lives easier and information more democratized, but on the other hand, it has also created unusual challenges for society in general and law enforcement in particular. In said background, the Academy organizes Orientation Programme on Law, Technology and Development and conducts sessions on various issues concerning law enforcement and technology- Technological Advancement: Impact on Individual/Group Rights, Right to Privacy and Data Protection, Medical Technology, Artificial Intelligence, Crime and Technology, E-governance etc. Five such orientation programmes were organized in the year 2018.





4. Ubuntu Training at District Courts-

The eCourts Integrated Mission Mode Project has computerized District and Subordinate courts and has upgraded the information and communication technology (ICT) infrastructure of the Supreme Court and the High Courts,

connecting all the courts in the country to National Judicial Data Grid. Unified national core application software – 'Case Information System (CIS) software' - has also been developed and made available for use at all computerized courts. Thus, as part of 'Change Management' exercise, all the Judicial Officers were trained in the use of UBUNTU Linux OS, to make them familiar with the use of the software and its immense benefits.

5. Mental Health Programmes:

i.) The Mental Healthcare Act, 2017 is based on the 'social model' of disability, which locates the disability in the social environment as compared to the earlier 'medical model' which located the disability within an individual. The Act is driven by a rights-based model to respect, protect and fulfil the rights of persons with mental disability. To underline this shift in the mental health jurisprudence, the Academy organized the workshop on Mental Health and the need of right based approach in handling matters of mental health.

ii.) Mental Health Law in the Criminal Justice System: An Expert Training Workshop

This two-day workshop was organized by the Academy in collaboration with National Law University, Delhi on mental health law in the criminal justice system. The participants included the Sessions Court Judges, public prosecutors, Indian mental health professionals, legal and forensic law and psychiatry experts, London and Indian lawyers and experts in the field of mental health.

iii.) Orientation Programme on Mental Healthcare Act, 2017-

Further, pursuant to the directions given by Hon'ble High Court of Delhi in *Ravinder v Govt. of NCT of Delhi* (2018) V AD (Delhi) 283, the orientation programmes were organized for Judicial Officers, Police Officers, Jail Superintendents and Doctors in NCR of Delhi on Mental Healthcare Act, 2017.

6. Colloquium on Human Trafficking (for all officers of DHJS & DJS)-

Human trafficking is one of the gravest violations of human rights. Earlier it was considered limited for the purpose of prostitution, but in recent years, the other facets of trafficking have come to forefront. Realizing the sensitivity of the issues the Academy organized Colloquium on Human Trafficking for all the officers of Delhi Judiciary. In the colloquium it was highlighted that the victims of trafficking, being a victim themselves are often under the fear of being booked as an offender in the trafficking cases and thus their rehabilitation and reintegration becomes crucial aspect of the cases, requiring immediate attention of the courts.





7. Orientation Programme on Commercial Courts (for all Civil Judges and ADJs)-

The nature of commerce and business has undergone a sea change, starting from the barter system to today's ecommerce. With the changing nature of business transactions, the ways of adjudication also need to be changed. Therefore, the orientation programmes on commercial courts was developed with the principal aim to build a strong foundation of the participants regarding the Commercial Courts Act, 2015 and the recent amendment. As India has been improving in 'Ease of Doing Business' index, efficiency in the adjudication of commercial matters becomes matter of importance. Thus it is axiomatic to equip the Judicial Officers with the understanding of modified procedures of law for a speedy adjudication to enhance global prestige of India.





8. Training Programme on Supervisory & Administrative Skills for the Judicial Officers-

A well-functioning judicial system requires diverse set of skills other than adjudication. Without supervisory and administrative skills, dispensation of justice is nearly impossible. Thus, Two-Day training programme on Supervisory and Administrative Skills for those DHJS & DJS Officers, who are looking after administrative responsibilities, was organized. The sessions highlighted administration and time management. The session also included training on sexual harassment at workplace laws to make courts gender inclusive spaces.

9. Conference for Capacity Building for other Stake Holders-

Efficiency and effectiveness of justice delivery in any system depends on working of various stakeholders other than Judicial Officers. Thus Academy has endeavoured to train various other stakeholders which include-

i.) Public Prosecutors-

Prosecutors are one of the most crucial links in criminal justice administration. Thus Academy has detailed scheme of organizing various training programmes for public prosecutors. In the year 2018, eight such programmes were organized. These programmes relate to medico-legal evidence, electronic evidence, offences against women, sentencing and compensation, drug trafficking and legal regime, and constitutional vision of criminal justice system etc.

ii.) Estate Officers-

One day Training Workshop was organized for Estate Officers on request of Directorate of Estates. The aim of the workshop was to the train the officers on working of The Public Premises (Eviction of Unauthorized

Occupants) Act, 1971 and responsibilities and role of Estate Officers.

iii.) Chairperson/Members of Child Welfare Committee Members

Two workshops were organized for Chairperson and Members of Child Welfare Committees on legal and psychological issues of both Children in Need of Care and Protection and Children in Conflict with Law.

iv.) Principal Magistrates and Members, Juvenile Justice Board

A Two-day workshop was organized 2018 for Principal Magistrates & Members of Juvenile Justice Boards and SJPU Officers with focus on child psychology, issues of law and rehabilitation of survivors.

v.) Principal Counsellors of Family Court

The Academy organized a Two day workshop for Principal Counsellors attached to family courts. The workshop saw sessions on three themes – mediation skills, psychological perspective on counselling and legal regime on mediation and counselling in family law matters.

vi.) Chairperson and Members of Permanent Lok Adalats under DSLSA

There is growing consensus that speedy justice is part of right to life under Ar. 21 of the Constitution. It is doubtful if delayed justice can at all be called 'justice'. Thus speedy disposal of cases without compromising on rights of parties has emerged as major challenge for court. Here role of Lok Adalats become self-evident. Realizing this, the Academy organized a one day training programme for Chairpersons and Members of

Permanent Lok Adalats under DSLSA. In the sessions vision of speedy justice and legal aid vis-a-vis challenges of Lok Adalats were discussed.

vii.) Special Executive Magistrates-

A three-day training programme was organized for Assistant Superintendent of Police (ACPs) who have been given power of Special Executive Magistrates under section 70 of Delhi police Act, 1978. As per the orders of Hon'ble High Court of Delhi in *Aldanish Rein v. NCT Delhi (*2018 SCC OnLine Del 12207), this workshop was organized to train the Special Executive Magistrates on their role under Chapter-VIII of Code of Criminal Procedure. The principal aim of the workshop was to highlight the need of protection of personal liberties from unnecessary arrest in exercise of power by SEMs under the said chapter.

10. Training of Judges from Other States of India

The Academy has organized training for Judicial Officers of other states. These trainings provide us insight into the challenges faced by subordinate courts in other states and guide us in understanding the best practices required for effective dispensation of justice. Following are the trainings organized for judges from other states in the year 2018-

- 1. Orientation Programme for Newly appointed Civil Judges of Tamil Nadu -6th February, 2018
- 2. Visit and Stay of Prob. Civil Judges (Jr. Div.) of Bihar-8th and 14th March 2018
- 3. Visit of 15 Judicial Officers in Civil Cadre (Jr. Div) of Mizoram Judicial Service on Best Legal Practices and Procedures- 20 May 2018- 27 May 2018
- 4. 40 hours Mediation Training Programme for 22 Mediators of Nagaland-11th to 15th September, 2018

- 5. Visit of newly inducted / recruited 24 Civil Judges and JMFCs from Gujarat- 24th to 29th September, 2018
- 6. Visit of 15 Judicial Officers of Arunachal Pradesh and Nagaland, Assam and visit by Kashmir Judicial Academy members

11. Visits of Foreign Dignitaries-

In the current era of globalization, the challenges facing the justice dispensation system are multi-dimensional and diverse for each nation and yet these challenges are the same. Solutions then, would also be common. Thus collaboration and coordination with justice delivery mechanisms of other nations provide a unique opportunity to learn from experiences of others. Believing the same, the Academy has actively engaged with foreign judges and officers. In the year 2018, the Academy saw visits by following dignitaries-

i.) Training Program for 40 Bangladesh Judicial Officers-

The Academy organized Training Program for about **40** Officers from Bangladesh on diverse range of laws including IPR, environmental laws and criminal law.

ii.) Workshop for 26 Presidents of Labour Tribunals of Sri Lanka

A training workshop was organized for 26 Presidents of Labour Tribunals from Sri Lanka.

iii.) Visit of 50 Participants from 35 Countries through BPST

Around 50 participants from diverse range of countries- Afghanistan, Peru, Jordan, Nigeria, Sri Lanka etc. visited the Academy through Bureau of Parliamentary Studies and Training (BPST).

iv.) 5 Member Delegations from Nepal-

A 5 member delegation from Nepal led by Hon'ble Judge, High Court and Sr. Academic Director Nepal Judicial Academy visited the Academy to exchange ideas and best practices in South Asia on judicial education and training.

v.) Note of Understanding with Bhutan National Legal Institute-

The Academy signed Note of Understanding with Bhutan National Legal Institute for establishing an Institutional Linkage between the Delhi Judicial Academy and BNLI. The aim of the NoU is to impart training and develop reading material for judicial officials of working in courts of Bhutan. The Director of BNLI visited Academy in this regard on 19th February 2018.

12. Environment Awareness and Stress Management Retreats-

As a part of training programme, the Academy every year organizes retreats for the Officers of DHJS and DJS. The retreats provide a wonderful opportunity for the judges to relax, understand their peers and get some time to spend with their own selves. These retreats also expose the officers to socio-cultural and environmental heritage and challenges of India. In 2018, four retreats, were organized by the Academy to the following places-

- 1. Binsar-Jageshwar, Uttrakhand- 13-15 April, 2018
- 2. Dharmshala, Himanchal Pradesh-11-13 May, 2018

13. Induction Course for newly inducted officers of DJS-

Constituent Assembly of India envisaged role of judges as 'first line of defence' for protection of individual liberties. Keeping this vision in mind, the Academy undertakes Induction training programme for newly inducted officers of Delhi Judicial Services. The induction course is organized throughout period of one year and encompasses various hands on trainings, court attachments and technical sessions on substantive and procedural laws.

14. Reflective Training for Promoted Officers-

In the light of 'Restatement of Values of Judicial Life' adopted by the Chief Justices Conference of India; Bangalore Principles, 2002 and Canons of Judicial Ethics – Delhi High Court Rules, a one day reflective training was organized for Promoted officers of DHJS (promoted in the year 2016 and 2017) to reflect, discuss and make note of the gaps in the training and take stock of as to how the training has been useful to them.

15. Conference for District & Sessions Judges, Registrar General, Registrar (Vigilance), Principal Judges (Family Courts) and other Higher Judicial Service Officers-

For an efficient and effective judicial system effectual performance from all stakeholders is required, as a result a one day conference was organized with the objective of discussing the role and responsibilities of District & Sessions Judges, Registrar General, Registrar (Vigilance), Principal Judges (Family Courts) and other Higher Judicial Service Officers in functioning of the



Judiciary. The conference aimed at providing a platform for frank and open discussion on various challenges faced by various officers of court and find out effective solutions to them.

16. Other Collaborative Programme-

Central Project Coordinator (CPC) and District System Administrator (DSA) of every High Court; and Trainers, Mediation and Conciliation Centre.

As a part of collaborative approach, the Academy organized for the training of each Central Project Coordinator (CPC) and one District System Administrator (DSA) from every High Court in collaboration with e-committee, Supreme Court of India. Also, a programme on Developing Advanced Training Skills for Trainers was conducted in collaboration with Mediation and Conciliation Project Committee, Supreme Court of India.
